Are Seminaries Irrelevant?

What do you think? Reply here.

One of the most striking, and troubling, trends in the Church today is the assumption that seminary training is not necessary for pastoral leadership. Just yesterday the pastor of a large and growing church in our area was talking about an excellent young preacher he is working into the preaching rotation. I asked if the

young man had seminary training. "No." Will you direct him to study at the seminary? "No, he's already a good preacher." That conversation typifies the commonly held perspective that seminary training, or any formal theological education, is irrelevant to ministry leadership.

The editor of a leading journal for pastors wrote in an email to me a couple of years ago, "Our readers are not interested in seminaries *per se*, but they are very interested in theological education." Fascinating. When, how and why did the disconnect between seminary and theological education occur? What are the consequences of this decoupling of seminary training and pastoral leadership for the Church in the years ahead? What are the consequences of an untrained clergy on the credibility of the gospel in our society in the years ahead?

I suspect not. I guess we care more for our teeth and our money than we do for our spiritual lives and witness.

Recognizing that no seminary program can adequately address all the challenges of ministry, what do you believe are the primary reasons that someone aspiring to ministry leadership should attend seminary?
